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Widening Fellowships

Widening Fellowships were introduced as a response to low success rates in Marie Skłodowska-Curie Individual Fellowships (MSCA IF), submitted by experienced researchers with host institutions based in widening countries. In order to shorten the between more and gap performing countries, the latter ones expressed a need to launch a mechanism that would help them to increase their participation in H2020 projects, and hence to increase their potential by attracting the most talented researchers and trigger brain circulation and knowledge exchange.

From this year on, the MSCA IF applicants whose proposals were scored above the threshold but were not funded due to budget limits, will automatically be redirected to the Widening Fellowship (WF) call, unless they wish to opt-out. This means there will be no separate application to these fellowships. The applicants will apply to MSCA IF call.

The Widening Fellowship scheme is foreseen for four panels of the European Fellowships:

- Standard European Fellowships (ST)
 fellowships divided into eight scientific
 areas: CHE, SOC, ECO, ENG, ENV, LIF,
 MAT, PHY;
- Career Restart Panel (CAR)
 multidisciplinary panel for researchers
 who intend to resume their research in
 Europe after a career break (e.g. after
 parental leave, working outside
 research, etc.);
- Reintegration Panel (RI)
 multidisciplinary panel for researchers
 who wish to return and reintegrate in a
 long term position in Europe;
- Society and Enterprise Panel (SE)
 multidisciplinary panel for researchers
 who apply with a host institution from
 non-academic sector.

Global Fellowships, with mandatory outgoing phase in a non-associated third country, are excluded from the scheme.





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Widening Fellowships

Eligible applicants are experienced researchers of any nationality, who at the call deadline have either a PhD degree or at least four years of full-time equivalent research experience.

Researchers have to meet the mobility rule, i.e. they may not apply with an institution based in a country in which they have resided or carried out their main activity (work, studies, etc.) for more than 12 months in the three years immediately prior to the call deadline (for ST panel) or for more than 36 months the five years immediately prior to the call deadline (for CAR, RI, SE panels).

The call will be launched on 12 April 2018 with **deadline of 12 September 2018**. The budget allocations for the three upcoming calls are as follow:

- 2018: 5 mln €;
- 2019: 6 mln €;
- 2020: 7 mln €.

Since Widening Fellowships is a part of Spreading Excellence and Widening Participation Work Programme, and not the MSCA programme, the fellows will not be considered as MSC Fellows. However, they will still be able to pursue their research in Europe and develop their careers under the same conditions as MSC Fellows.

WHAT IS COST ALL ABOUT

COST Programme - European Cooperation in Science & Technology - is the longestrunning EU-funded programme created in 1971. It enables researchers to set up their interdisciplinary research networks Europe and beyond through so-called Actions (thematic research driven projects). Actions must involve at least 7 participants open to researchers from are universities, public and private research institutions as well as NGOs, industry and SMEs.

COST provides funds for organising conferences, meetings, training schools, scientific exchanges and other networking activities.

The actual research costs are financed either by participants themselves or cofinanced national from budgets, Switzerland has a COST-dedicated budgetline, or Czech Republic has a special programme called INTER-COST.

All Member States are full COST members, with Israel being the only Cooperating State.

COST receives funding from Horizon 2020 programme (€ 300 mil. in total) from two Work Programmes: SC6 Europe changing world — Inclusive, innovative and reflective societies (around € 20 mil. each year to reinforce its networking activities) and SEWP (around € 20 mil. each year to foster inclusive policy).

NEW COST MEASURES

COST programme gradually introduces new measures to widen European research base and support capacity building. Among them there are the following:

ITC CONFERENCE GRANTS

Conference grant is a new COST Action networking tool and it gives specific support to PhD students and Early-Career Investigators (ECI) from participating "Inclusiveness Target Countries" (ITC) to international S&T related attend conferences that are not organised by a COST Action. Any e-COST user mentioned above who is affiliated with an institution located in an ITC country participating in the Action can submit an application request for this kind of grant (at least 45 days before the conference start date). All other details including the type of approval supporting documents, and payments are available in the User guide published in April 2017.

COST ACADEMY

COST Academy was launched in September 2017 and it offers dedicated training and mentoring to boost the leadership, management, administrative and communications skills of young and/or ICT researchers. Trainings take place at the Brussels COST office and are led by COST and external experts, combining theory with practical exercises and involving best practice cases.

COST Academy includes: Main proposers' workshops; Leadership workshops; Grant holder workshops; and Science communication and media training.

Future COST Academy events are displayed here. Online courses are to be added on COST website during 2018, including mentoring for grant holders and for Action Chairs and Action Vice-Chairs.

COST CONNECT

COST Connect is a series of thematic workshops that provide open space for researchers, policy makers and research and innovation stakeholders to network and develop their ideas. The topics of workshops are defined around specific criteria taking into account stakeholders' input and highlighted needs, the current EU policy agenda, major societal challenges and research fields where a critical mass of COST Actions is involved.

The interactive format of these events encourages dialogue, active engagement, creation of synergies and brainstorming. This event concept reduces fragmentation and makes research more efficient by avoiding duplication. More information on thematic workshops is available here.

OUTLOOK TO FP9

To prepare COST for the next Framework Programme (2021-2027), the Committee of Senior Officials (in the presence Director-General for Research and Innovation Robert-Jan Smits) approved in December 2017 its Strategic Plan that will drive COST throughout the end of Horizon 2020 and the next Framework Programme (FP9).

COST will focus on three strategic priorities: spreading promoting and excellent fostering interdisciplinary research; research for breakthrough science; and empowering and retaining researchers and innovators. Regarding the FP9, COST requests a total budget of € 600 mil. (twice as much as in H2020), but promises to double the funded new Action every year (up to 75) with more than 625 running networks a year (more than doubling the current figure). A COST Innovators Grant scheme for exploring innovation potential will be developed.

Due to its proven track-record of networking researchers across Europe and its success in reaching out to researchers and innovators in the less-research and innovation intensive countries, COST can play a significant role in supporting the instruments of SEWP programme in H2020 and its successor in FP9.

A new Teaming Centre: FunGlass Center of innovation at the Alexander Dubček University of Trenčín, Slovakia

Alexander Dubček University's FunGlass Centre was selected for funding under the European framework program Horizon 2020. The Center, led by a team of the University's Centre of excellence for ceramics, glass and silicate materials, headed by prof. Galusek, was selected out 160 submitted proposals to be one of ten funded Teaming projects in the European Union, to spread excellence.

As part of this programme, the Centre will receive financial support of 15 M€ for the period of 2017-2023, designed to mainly upgrade the existing Centre to become an internationally recognized research institute for functional and surface functionalized glass – FunGLASS.

The new FunGlass center will create 44 new jobs for highly qualified research personnel and administration staff as well as attract an influx of experts from other countries, with the aim of building a multidisciplinary, creative, and highly competitive and motivating research environment.

The FunGlass center will provide an extensive training program for researchers and PhD students, familiarizing them with the environment and research culture at advanced partners' institutions, honing attendees' skills to international standards, which afterwards will be transferred back to their home institution making them "ambassadors" of international research skills to other institutions in the Slovak Republic.

A new Teaming Centre: FunGlass Center of innovation at the Alexander Dubček University of Trenčín, Slovakia

The success of this project is attributed to a close cooperation with leading experts and institutions in glass science and technology in Europe, namely Prof. Enrico Bernardo from the Universita degli Studi di Padova (Italy), Prof. Aldo Boccaccini from the Friedrich — Alexander Universität Erlangen-Nürnberg (Germany), Prof. Alicia Durán from the Instituto de Ceramica y Vidrio Madrid (Spain), and Prof. Lothar Wondraczek from the Friedrich-Schiller UniversitätJena (Germany), who are also the partners and members of the project consortium.

The establishment of the Centre is also supported by leading glass producers in the Slovak republic, namely Johns Manville Trnava, RONA Lednické Rovne, and Vetropack Nemšová, as well as professional organizations such as Slovak Glass Society, Czech Glass Society, Union of Glass Industry of the Slovak republic, and International Commission on Glass, the organization most important comprising 33 national organizations and unions of glass science and technology from all around the globe.

Furthermore, following inclusion in this European framework program, the center received a letter of commitment from the former minister of education, science, research and sports of the Slovak republic, Mr. Peter Plavčan, that promised the Centre will receive additional funding from the Operational program Research and Innovations of at least 10 M€ for upgrade and extension of its research facilities.

March 2018

A new Teaming Centre: FunGlass Center of innovation at the Alexander Dubček University of Trenčín, Slovakia

On March 1, 2017 the FunGlass center was launched, focusing on research and innovation in the field of glass with specific functional properties; luminescent, electric, sorption and comprised of new types of bioglasses and bioglass-based composites personalized health care. Such materials can be used as implants for bone or soft tissues replacement and regeneration, materials for generation of energy from renewable sources (photovoltaics), glasses specialized coatings with with antibacterial, photocatalytic and selfcleaning properties, reflective and antireflection coatings, ultra-strong glasses, production of high value added materials from waste, just to name a few.

As a result, the University of Trenčín recognized FunGlass as an independent research Centre with a specific status in the framework of the University, with personal, financial and research autonomy. Nevertheless, the process of establishing the FunGlass center was not without difficulties to overcome, such as some cases incompatibility between the legislation of the Slovak republic, the European Union and the rules and requirements of the programme. However, the most serious hurdle that the Center is still facing is the lagging national co-funding, which threatens the project timeframes, training programs, research activities and even posing a risk of funds suspension by the Horizon 2020 program.








JPI Urban Europe — Get Acquainted

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Forthcoming Calls

An upcoming call for Horizon 2020 pillar: **Spreading Excellence and Widening Participation** has been announced by the European Commission. A budget of roughly 165 Million euros will become available for coordinators from widening countries to address the measures such as coordination or support services, mutual learning exercises and studies, networking as well as dissemination, awareness-raising and communication.

Forthcoming calls are foreseen to be opened by 15th of May and deadline is set for 15th of November, allowing more than a half a year for the consortia to submit competitive proposals. The greatest share of the budget is dedicated to the Teaming Phase 2 call. This will be the final Phase 2 call within the multiannual Horizon 2020 programme for centres of excellence to gain recognition and maturity. See the detailed timeline of the calls on page 16. It should be noted that ERA Chair call 2019 will be opened already this year on 26th of July, and the deadline of the call is on 15 November 2018.

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ARE YOU FAMILIAR WITH THE NEW HORIZON 2020 DASHBOARD?

The new Horizon 2020 Dashboard on the Horizon 2020 Participant Portal is an online presentation of implementation data of Horizon 2020. The Dashboard is user-friendly and offers new powerful analytical functions.

At this stage, the Dashboard provides two sets of functionalities:

- Aggregated data on participation in proposals (be advised: detailed proposal data are not accessible due to confidentiality conditions)
- Aggregated and detailed data on funded projects (one may look for specific information according to the ID call, type of action, partner type, Country statistics, and much more).

On top of that, the former "Find a Project" was uplifted to "Success Stories", with the most recent success stories from the EU Research.
